Course Description & Materials

Catalog Course Description

Field experience is designed to allow the student "hand's on" opportunities to observe, understand, and participate in an organization's community services. This experience will allow the student to test his or her ability to work and relate to both an academic and on-site supervisor who will provide the student with feedback about the student's participation in therapeutic and educational activities. The student will explore certain aspects of the placement (be those site analysis or questions about the particular population) by relating learning with his or her practical experience.

Time Allocation

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 37.5 hours of engagement. For example, in a one credit hour traditional face to face course, students spend 50 minutes in class per week for 15 weeks, resulting in a minimum of 12.5 instructional hours

for the semester. Students are expected to engage in reading and other assignments outside of class for at least 2 additional hours per week, which equals an additional 25 hours. These two sums result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for the course, the total engagement time expected for each one credit course at Chaminade.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This is a three-credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy (as shown above). Students enrolled in this course are anticipated to spend 30 hours for weekly journals, 37.5 hours on weekly assessments, 10 hours on a clinical case presentation & service project, 3 hours peer mentor training & learning style response, 5 hours on training and event tracking, 8 hours to complete NASPA certified peer education training, 2 hours QPR Suicide Prevention Training, 2 hours Title IX training, 3 hours Mental Health Crisis Training, 2 hours self-care training, and 2 hours FERPA and HIPAA training. Additional hours include 8.5 Counseling Center Activities provided to the university student body.

Student Responsibilities and Requirements:

The student will obtain professional liability insurance. (http://www.cphins.com/mentalhealth or http://www.hpso.com/)

The student will select a community agency of interest, make contact with a supervisor and arrange an interview.

When the student and agency (person/supervisor) agree on the work experience, hours of attendance, the supervisor/person in-charge and the student will sign a memorandum of understanding.

During the first three weeks of the experience, the student will work to determine his or her learning objectives. These objectives will be assessed by the final paper. These objectives will be based on observations that are gathered by working at the site, and student's specific areas of interest.

The student will work with agency/site for the agreed upon weekly hours.

The student will keep a weekly journal (anecdotal experiences) that may help shape his or her development of a study.

The student will meet with the instructor on an arranged basis to discuss the field experience. Two weeks before the end of the Fall semester, the student will give the Student Evaluation Form (see attached) to the supervisor/agency. The Supervisor should complete the form and review it with the student. The student will than hand deliver the original Student Evaluation Form to the course instructor no later than the last day of the Fall semester.

Instructor Responsibilities:

The instructor will coordinate with the placement supervisor to ensure that the experience is meaningful and structured.

The instructor will be available to answer questions regarding the project to expedite the learning process.

The instructor will read and comment upon the different components of this project in a timely manner.

Marianist Values

- Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship.
- Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom.
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Attendance
