Catalog Course Description

Basic principles of drawing using a variety of media. Analysis of perspective, composition, space and volume relations, shading, and gesture drawing. Six hours per week. This course fulfills the Fine Arts general education requirement. Offered every semester. *Co-requisites/Pre-Requisites: No prerequisites required.*

Time Allocation

Example CHP course description: This is a four-credit hour course requiring 180 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Over the 15 weeks of this course, students will spend 80 hours on Canvas writing, reading, and watching content, and the rest of the 100 hours drawing, which equates to 6.5 hours of drawing per week, for drawing practice, sketchbook, and assignments.

Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

This course provides quality education in learning how to draw, and we focus on how to adapt and change to various drawing subjects and how we can learn from drawing and art and apply it to life, but also learn from life and apply it to art. We also explore diversity in art and consider social justice or themes such as family in our chosen topics of art.

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God.
- Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep.
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship.
- Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom.
- Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Discussion Boards - 35 points per Discussion (25 points for initial post, 10 points for replies)

Weekly discussion board posts on Canvas about readings, videos, and contemporary artists. You are expected to contribute in a meaningful way to the course online community, to use critical thinking to think about your art and others' art, and to not use Ai to write your discussion posts. Once you write a discussion board post and publish it, then Canvas will allow you to see other classmate's posts and read them to reply to them.

Weekly Sketchbooks - 5 points each

Draw weekly sketches of anything of your choice (follow weekly Modules in Canvas to-do lists),

and upload them to the Student Google Drive

folder:<u>https://drive.google.com/drive/u/0/folders/14ldXn_yzRVOZ5rd5P1novJwAEAH1uh_J</u> You are expected to draw these sketches on any piece of paper and to spend only 5-15 minutes on the sketch in order to have fun with it and not have a lot of pressure.

Individual Assignments -35 points each

You are expected to spend 4 hours total on each larger drawing assignments. Each assignment due date is listed in the course schedule on Canvas, as well as in each module you will find the assignment info with their appropriate due dates. You are expected to draw on one larger piece of paper (Strathmore Drawing Pad, Medium Surface, Medium or Heavy Weight, 18" x 24") for each assignment. You are expected to tape the edges of your drawing so that the edges are clean if you end up showing your art in the gallery art show on campus at the end of the semester. Final Project & Final Presentation. - 50 points (35 points for final project, 25 points for presentation)

Please read the final project called "Real & Imagined" on Canvas for information, found in Modules weeks 9-12. You have a month to work on this project to really put your all into it and the ultimate goal is to do your best work you've ever done in the semester. Then you are expected to create a short 1-5 minutes video presentation of all of your work you created in the semester and explain you and your drawings grew through this class. You are expected to be confident at describing your art and process after practicing the entire semester in the online discussion board talking about your art and other people's art.

Attendance

This is asynchronous so there is no live class meeting. You are expected to do all the work and keep track of what is due every week. If you do not show up to the course (meaning, post on the discussion boards and submit the work on Canvas and in the google drive folder) for 2 weeks, at any point in the first half of the semester, you will be automatically dropped from the asynchronous course, per Chaminade policy.

Late Work

No late work is accepted without a doctor's note. Only with a doctor's note, late work is accepted up to 1 week past the due date, unless you have chronic health problems then you can meet with me to discuss to give you an extra week extension. You should contact the resource center to register your disability before beginning class if you are able to. Any additional

extensions that are not medical related require Dean's or school counselors permission; please contact them to ask them for permission.

Please note that if you are submitting any work late, there is a higher chance that you will not receive any feedback on your work. The course operates in a consecutive manner so it is important to turn work on time to stay on track properly with the course. From my own life experience, I understand that sometimes life can be very difficult and it is important to reach out to seek professional help. Please also see the counseling center on campus for free counseling for all students. Please also be in contact with the university if you have any serious health issues that need accommodation, ideally prior to the course beginning.

The only extra credit offered is to submit an artwork to the art show about the BRidge on Campus at the beginning of the semester. You can submit your art to Eibin 209 on the black shelf by Feb 2nd. Please email me if you are interested in this extra credit.

Questions to consider:

Assignments (35 points each)

1. *Self-reflection (5 points)* Did you reflect on and revise your work? Did you understand what you created?

2. *Work ethic (5 points)* Did you consistently work on your project? Did you spend at least 4 hours per week on your assignment?

3. *Risk and creativity (5 points)* Did you challenge yourself and think creatively? Did you engage in discussions about your project?

4. Engagement with the medium (5 points) Did you experiment with and research the medium? Did you use sketches or tests to finalize your work?

5. Degree of finish (10 points) Is your finished piece clear and cohesive? Does it look polished and complete?

6. Presentation and communication (5 points) Is your intention clear in your work? Did you present your work clearly to the class?

Attendance & Participation (35 points each week)

- 1. Attendance/Discussion Board (10 points) Did you submit meaningful posts? Did you show reasonable effort?
- 2. Community engagement (10 points) Did you contribute to classmates' learning? Did you communicate respectfully and helpfully?

3. Presentation of your project (5 points) Did you participate in critiques? Did you upload clear images of your work?

4. Preparation and focus (10 points) Did you use class time effectively? Were you prepared with materials and homework complete?

5. Sketchbook Drawings (5 points each week) Did you complete one sketch for 5-15 minutes and turn it in on time?
