Introduction to Drama

Course Objectives:

The course objective is to introduce to the student the richness of poetry and drama in our literature, and to enhance the student's appreciation and understanding of these. In addition, students' critical thinking skills will be sharpened through careful analysis of poetry and drama.

Course Requirements:

- a. Students are required to read all assignments. Occasional reading quizzes, covering content, will be given to ensure that reading has been completed.
- b. Regular attendance and participation in class discussions is required.
- c. Two short papers (3 pp.), one on poetry and one on drama, will be required. There will also be a final exam. Papers must follow the guidelines for written work. All papers must be turned in by the deadlines.

Guidelines for Written Work:

- a. All work should be typed and double-spaced on standard-sized white paper. Please use a standard font (not italics or Coronet) in the main body of the paper.
- b. Include a cover page, with your name, course number, and my name, as well as the title of your paper.
- c. Attach a list of references to the end of your paper.
- d. Proofread your work. Papers with grammatical or spelling errors will be marked down.

HELPFUL HINTS: Title of plays are underlined (<u>Oedipus Rex</u>) or italicized (<u>Oedipus Rex</u>); titles of poems appear in quotation marks: ("Ozymandius.")
