INTRODUCTION

The course is designed to give the student an introduction to and an appreciation of both poetry and drama. In order to do so, the course will examine works from each genre and provide approaches for analyzing those works. The course will cover the technical aspects (form, structure, characterization) and consider the literal and extended meanings of the texts. Class sessions will consist of discussions, group work, individual and group readings, and writing workshops.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY: Class meetings are essential. Excused absences must be documented and approved by the instructor. If a student misses more than 2 class sessions, his/her final grade may be reduced. GRADING: All assignments are graded on a 10 point scale.
