COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance is required at all classes. Students are expected to participate in class discussions of assigned readings.

The final grade is based on four parts: 30% for the poetry test, 15% for the poetry oral presentation, 40% for the drama test, and 15% for attendance and critique of a play.

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ORAL PRESENTATION REQUIREMENTS

The work selected for the oral presentation on a poem may be chosen from the Additional Poems section of the text (from page 271) or from an outside source. Students may select any poem from the text NOT scheduled to be discussed in class. If the work is from another source, the student must provide copies of the poem for each member of the class at least one class meeting prior to the scheduled presentation date. Date sign up must be completed by Wednesday July 5, 2000, and all selections must be made by Monday. July 10, 2000, in order to avoid any conflicts. Presentations will start on Wednesday, July 12, 2000.

Each oral presentation should run approximately eight to ten minutes, depending of the length of the selection. The final time limit requirement will be determined by the number of students enrolled in the class.

Each report must consist of three parts:

- (1) a BRIEF biography of the author, concentrating of material dealing with the work chosen
- (2) PRESENTING/RECITING the poem for the class, with an overall analysis of the work.
 - Briefly discuss what you think the author is trying to communicate to the reader, pointing out lines or passages you found most effective, interesting, or revealing. This section is the focus of the presentation.
- (3) YOUR CRITICISM of the work what do you think of the poem, what you like or dislike about it. You may refer to published criticism of the story, but the concentration should be on your reactions and viewpoint.

A written summary of the presentation within one week after the presentation. This written report is part of the requirements of the assignment. Failure to submit the written summary will result in the loss of grade standing.

Each report must be given on schedule. Only under special circumstances will changes be allowed, and any changes must be approved and coordinated with the instructor in advance. Failure to give an oral presentation will result in an F for 15% of the final grade.
