Course Description & Materials

Catalog Course Description

This course provides an introduction to the methods and rules for organizing and interpreting observations; descriptive and inferential statistics, including frequency distributions, hypothesis testing, simple analysis of variance, estimation, and the Chi-Square.

Co-requisites/Pre-Requisites: EN 102 and PSY 101



Time Allocation

This is a three-credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Over the 15 weeks of this course, students will spend 37.5 hours in class, 45 hours reading course material, 45 hours completing quizzes, chapter exercises and using SPSS, and 7.5 hours participating in communities of practice and other course activities.

PSY 315 Behavioral Science Statistics is guided by the Marianist Educational Value of Educate for Adaptation and Change. Father Chaminade said, "new times call for new methods." Evolutionary Psychology seeks to identify and understand how human traits (e.g., cognition and behaviors) have adapted to environmental challenges since our earliest ancestors. This value guides this course through its focus on the development of:

- 2. Being respectful of differences;
- 3. Critical thinking; and
- 4. Open-mindedness.

This will be found in our discussions and in our capstone project, where we will look at how our ability to adapt to environmental challenges influence our perception of success in our lives.

- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Course Activities

Chapter Quizzes

18 chapter quizzes (135 points total): Each week students will complete practice chapter quizzes on our Canvas LMS. These quizzes will help students master the concepts covered in each chapter and prepare for more complex statistical applications.

Chapter Exercises

Chapter exercises (85 points total): These exercises will increase student comprehension, application, analysis, synthesis, and evaluation of the chapter content. Students will gain hands-on experience with statistical concepts and SPSS software.

SPSS Assignments

Students will learn to use SPSS statistical software for data analysis throughout the course. Assignments will include data entry, variable coding, statistical function performance, and output interpretation. These skills are essential for research in the behavioral sciences.

Scientific Method Applications

The scientific method will be emphasized throughout the course as students learn to assess relationships between variables and test hypotheses using statistical techniques. Understanding the philosophy and application of science is central to the course.

Scientific Method Definitions

The METHODS OF SCIENCE are only tools, tools that we use to obtain knowledge about phenomena.

The SCIENTIFIC METHOD is a set of assumptions and rules about collecting and evaluating data. The explicitly stated assumptions and rules enable a standard, systematic method of investigation that is designed to reduce bias as much as possible. Central to the scientific method is the collection of data, which allows investigators to put their ideas to an empirical test, outside of or apart from their personal biases. In essence, stripped of all its glamour, scientific inquiry is nothing more THAN A WAY OF LIMITING FALSE CONCLUSIONS ABOUT NATURAL EVENTS.

A THEORY is a large body of interconnected propositions about how some portion of the world operates; a HYPOTHESIS is a smaller body of propositions. HYPOTHESES are smaller versions of theories. Some are derived or born from theories. Others begin as researchers' hunches and develop into theories.

THEORIES are not themselves directly proved or disproved by research. Even HYPOTHESES cannot be proved or disproved directly. Rather, research may either support or fail to support a particular hypothesis derived from a theory.

Scientific research has four general goals: (1) to describe behavior, (2) to predict behavior, (3) to determine the causes of behavior, and (4) to understand or explain behavior.

In order to verify the reliability and validity of scientific research it is important to replicate the results. It is the preponderance of evidence that establishes/supports the theory.
