Survey of Art I

Catalog Course Description

Survey of Eastern and Western Art from prehistory to the Gothic period. Lectures will be accompanied by slide presentations.

This historical art survey offers a broad-based introduction to Art History.

Students will be asked to participate regularly in class discussions, complete multi-option projects that explicate artworks, visit an Art museum or installation once, and create a short presentation of one chosen completed assignment from the term.

Marianist Values: This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

Native Hawaiian Values:

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Ōlelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe I ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike I ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Credit Hour Policy:

Required Student Engagement: 135 hours for the term

Lecture Time: 140 minutes a week watching and reading content on Canvas (2.3 hours)

Assignment Time: This is a three credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy, Students enrolled in this course are expected to spend about 140 minutes a week (2.3 hours) for in person or online classes, 50 hours on projects (including going to the museum), and 25 hours on reading and studying the textbook, and 25 hours answering discussion board questions and engaging on the discussion board. This breaks down to spending about just under 7 hours a week on the class.

The course requirements include:

- **online discussion**
- **weekly textbook and select readings**
- **1 multi-option final project flexible to your goals, spread across the second half of the semester**
- **1 museum project, spread across the first half of the semester**
- **A few short quizzes throughout the semester**

Attendance Policy
