#### **Catalog Description:**

The focus is on application of methods and theory from previous coursework. The student may be employed. The childcare setting and mentor teacher must be pre-approved by instructor prior to the start of the semester. Fieldwork requires 100 hours in an early childhood educational setting and 15 hours of seminar.

# **Student Conduct Policy**

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. When illness or personal reasons necessitate continued absence, the student should communicate first with the instructor to review the options. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

# **Credit Hour Policy**

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This three-credit course requires 135 clock hours of student engagement per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are expected to spend about \_\_80\_\_ hours completing the readings &instruction, \_\_\_80\_\_ hours completing daily discussions, \_\_55\_\_ hours completing assignments, and Key Assignments, which are replacement assignments for the midterm/final exam.
