University Course Catalog Description

This capstone course with a clinical immersion experience offers the student the opportunity to synthesize nursing knowledge. The student will have the opportunity to further develop clinical skills and practice leadership and management skills through immersion in a clinical setting.

Course Overview

NUR 499 is a three credit, clinical immersion course (135 clinical hours) that occurs in the second half of the final semester of the BSN nursing program. The 135 clinical hours can include simulation, skills lab, virtual simulation, and patient care in a clinical site. Clinical experiences may occur with a one-to-one RN preceptor or in small cohorts with a clinical instructor.

Clinical Hours: Total clinical hours include facility/site orientation, evaluation with preceptor(s) or clinical instructors, and all clinically related activities such as direct patient care, administration of medication, assisting with diagnostic tests, patient assessment and documentation, unit & facility training, and interdisciplinary collaboration. Students may exceed clinical hours based on an agreement with preceptors and clinical faculty with course coordinator approval.

Marianist Values

Native Hawaiian Values

- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no eau (Olelo No eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Grading Scale

Letter grades are given in all courses except those conducted on a credit/no credit basis. Grades are calculated from the student's class participation, exams, papers, service-learning project and the infographic project. They are interpreted as follows:

IMPORTANT: This is a clinical practicum. Students must complete clinical hours by the end of the semester to pass the course. If a student has concerns or questions about tracking hours, he/she should discuss with Course Coordinator.

COURSE POLICIES:

Course Atmosphere:

This course is **not a lecture course.** Active engagement strategies are utilized for student learning. The classroom (canvas, clinical sites) is a teaching and learning environment where there is an exchange of knowledge and experience, so it is essential that students actively participate in all activities to maximize individual learning.

Attendance:

Students who are absent from clinicals diminish their opportunities to learn. Any absence must be communicated to the clinical instructor and preceptor per orientation instructions. Each student will be encouraged to develop a professional work ethic that reflects personal responsibility, initiative, and teamwork. Any student who stops attending class without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade. Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of class may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any absence of two weeks or more must be reported to the Associate Provost and the Records Office by the course instructor of record. Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

Assignments:

ALL assignments must be submitted to Canvas by the due date. All assignments are mandatory and must be completed by the scheduled due dates. Failure to do so will result in a "0" for the assignment. Faculty may offer extensions for assignments with evidence of extenuating circumstances and only if requested in advance of the deadline.

Writing policy:

All papers should demonstrate mastery of grammar, punctuation, spelling and syntax expected of college level students. Use of APA 7th edition is required for all papers. If you need writing assistance, please seek help from Student Support Services. Canvas has online tutoring available through Tutor Me. All papers are to be word processed, proofread, and solely the work of the author. All papers must be submitted on Canvas. Please read information about plagiarism in your student handbook.

Testing policy:

Students are expected to take tests on the designated day. In case of an emergency, please contact the instructor <u>prior</u> to the test so that an alternate plan can be made. Failure to do so will result in a zero.

Approval for taking a make-up test must be granted by the course instructor of record on a case-by-case basis. Make-up exams are highly discouraged. Students will be asked to remove hats, water bottles, phones & other paraphernalia in the front of the testing room during examinations.

Online Proctoring:

The School of Nursing may choose to utilize an online exam proctoring technology at any time during this course. This technology enables students to take proctored exams at a location that is off-campus. This technology provides a secure test environment that promotes academic integrity and provides data security. The process identifies a student and records video, audio, and screen capture during the student's exam. This information is communicated to secure servers and reviewed. The video, audio, and screen capture are used solely for the purpose of ensuring academic integrity during the testing process.

Grades of "Incomplete"

Incomplete grade may be granted at the discretion of the Course Coordinator and must be aligned with University policies.
