University Course Catalog Description

These selected topics in nursing are offered periodically. Pre-requisites may vary per topics and/or consent of the instructor. Past offerings include Palliative Care, Care Management Principles, and Quality and Safety in Nursing, Introduction to Veteran and Military Health Care, and Primary Care in Community Health Centers.

Requisites:

Upper Division Prerequisites: Take COM-101 EN-102. Course may require Dean, Instructor or Program Manager approval. - Must be completed prior to taking this course.

Clinical Hours: Total clinical hours include facility/site orientation, evaluation with preceptor(s) or clinical instructors, and all clinically related activities such as direct patient care, administration of medication, assisting with diagnostic tests, patient assessment and documentation, unit & facility training, and interdisciplinary collaboration. Students may exceed clinical hours based on an agreement with preceptors and clinical faculty with course coordinator approval.

Marianist Values

- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no eau (Ōlelo No eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This course is a 0 credit course.

Teaching-Learning Strategies:

CUH Clinical Faculty Role:

- Work with agency clinical coordinator/nurse manager to arrange preceptorship details.
- Meet with nursing student and preceptor at the beginning of the semester to orient them to their roles and internship expectations.
- Provide regular and timely supervision to ensure the learning experience is positive for the preceptor and student.
- Serve as a resource person to both the student and preceptor regarding academic procedures, and to provide consultation on the evaluation process, clarification of roles, etc.
- Spend time observing the student carry out their activities to obtain a more complete picture of the student's ability to function in clinical.
- Communicate with the preceptor to discuss the student's clinical progress.
- Coordinate mid-term and final evaluations with student and preceptor to evaluate the student's progress.

- Provide the faculty's contact information to the unit manager, the preceptor, and the student to discuss any clinical issues or concerns that may arise.
- Conduct the course orientation, midpoint discussion, final student presentations and provides feedback on student assignments.

Student's Role:

- Ensure preceptor has your Skills Checklist that has been approved by the SNHP department. Provide a copy if needed.
- Follow all agency policies and procedures.
- Follow the preceptor's schedule.
- Perform clinical skills within the job description of an RN at a particular facility with consideration of the following:
 - The preceptor provides direct supervision while the student performs new clinical skills.
 - The agency policy states that students may perform the intervention.
 - If the student has successfully demonstrated proficiency with a skill, the student may perform
 the skill independently with the preceptor's permission as long as the activity conforms to
 agency policy.
 - The student may not perform a specific task if the agency policy forbids students to perform that task.
- Adhere to the SONHP Approved Clinical Skills for Pre-Licensure Nursing Students clinical skill list.
- Provide the student's contact information to the clinical faculty and the preceptor to discuss any clinical issues or concerns that may arise
- Keep a daily record of completed clinical hours

Agency Preceptor Role:

- Identify an alternate preceptor in the event of illness, vacation or other assignments of the primary preceptor.
- Supervise and provide opportunities for clinical experiences appropriate to the student's level, subject to agency policy.
- Communicate the Unit's expectations to the student.
- Meet with nursing student and clinical faculty at the beginning of the semester to orient them to the preceptor's and the unit's expectations.
- Provide regular and timely feedback to ensure the learning experience is positive for both the preceptor and student.
- Serves as a resource person to both the student and clinical faculty regarding clinical procedures, and to provide consultation on the student's evaluation process, clarification of roles, etc.
- Communicate with the faculty to discuss the student's clinical progress.
- Provide input to the clinical faculty for the student's mid-term and final evaluations to evaluate the student's progress.
- Provide the preceptor's contact information to the clinical faculty and the student to discuss any clinical issues or concerns that may arise
- Confirm the student's daily log of completed hours by daily signing the student's timesheet

- Students will pre-chart physical assessments until told otherwise by his or her preceptor

- After pre-charting is approved by the preceptor, the student then may document the approved version in the client's hospital record.

N380 Course Requirements

- Course Structure: The Internship begins in Summer and finishes in Fall semesters. Students will complete a total of 270 precepted hours over the two semesters:
 - o 225 hours in the Summer
 - o 45 hours in the Fall
- The clinical schedule is negotiated between the student and preceptor.
- Daily timesheets are required of the student. The timesheet will contain a record of completed clinical hours.
- The preceptor will sign and initial the timesheet daily to confirm that the student has completed the hours.
- Preceptor's contact information: will be requested by CUH because this information is required to be on file by our accrediting agency (CCNE).
- Exchange of student-preceptor and clinical faculty contact information in the event of questions, illness or changes in scheduling.
- Orientation to the Unit: The student will follow preceptor on the first day to orient to unit schedule, environment, preceptor's organization and prioritization, flow of the unit, other staff, and the people, and paperwork. The student may begin their hands-on clinical activities on the next day with supervision.
- Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs): the student will draft their SLOs for the clinical faculty's review. Upon
 faculty review, the student and preceptor will review and discuss the SLOs, personal learning objectives,
 and clinical evaluation form early in the experience and come to a mutual agreement about the
 applicability of the evaluation components to the specific clinical setting and how the student can meet
 the SLOs.
- Organization and Priority Setting: The preceptor will spend 5 –10 minutes at the beginning of each shift to have the student go over their plan for the day: what patients will be seen first and why; what to assess for, etc. The student should gradually assume more patient care activities.
- Teaching Methods: A variety of teaching methods are used visual, auditory, reading, kinesthetic.
 - Demonstrate procedures, nursing skills and process (assessment, diagnosis, planning, intervention, evaluation) and have student observe you.
 - Role-model professional behavior, clinical competence, and therapeutic interactions with patient and team members.



- Provide opportunities for student learning experiences through selective patient care

assignments.
