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COURSE REQUIREMENTS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

401 Chaucer and the Late Medieval Period (3) A study of The Canterbury Tales, Troilus and Criseyde, and medieval lyrics and drama. Offered alternate years. Prerequisite: EN 255 or EN 256.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of this course is to expose the students to the various writers of the Chaucer and the Medievel Period of English Literature. Students are expected to read the works assigned for each class meeting. Students are expected to attend all class sessions and to participate in discussions of assigned readings

Each student will be required to write two 10 to 12 page essays. The first paper will be on the *Canterbury Tales* and the second paper will be on Chaucer's poetry. Each paper will focus on works elected by the student.

Each student will also be required to give an oral presentation of a work of his/her choice. Each presentation will focus on explaining the selected work, and will provide a summary and interpretation for other members of the class. Also required will be a written summary of the oral presentation given.

The final grade will be based on the following: 30% for the first paper on *Canterbury Tales*; 30% for the paper on Chaucer's poetry; 30% for the oral presentation; and 10% for class attendance and participation

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ORAL PRESENTATION REQUIREMENTS

All selections must be made by Tuesday, January 15, 2002, in order to avoid any conflicts. Presentations will start on Tuesday, January 22, 2002.

Each oral presentation should run approximately ten to fifteen minutes. The final time limit requirement and number of presentation for each class meeting will be determined by the number of students enrolled in the class.

Each report must consist of three parts:

(1) READING SELECTED PASSAGES, PRESENTING and SUMMARIZING the work for the class, with an overall analysis of the work. This section is the focus of the presentation.

Briefly discuss what <u>you</u> think Chaucer is trying to communicate to the reader, pointing out lines or passages you found most effective, interesting, or revealing.

(2) YOUR CRITICISM of the work - what do you think of the selection, what you like or dislike about it. You may refer to published criticism, but the concentration should be on your reactions and viewpoint.

A written report of the material for the presentation is due within one week after the presentation. This written report is part of the requirements of the assignment and counts as 30% of the final grade. Failure to submit the written summary will result in the loss of grade standing.

Each report must be given on schedule. Only under special circumstances will changes be allowed, and any changes must be approved and coordinated with the instructor in advance. Failure to give an oral presentation will result in an F for 30% of the final grade
