Course Learning Outcomes

This course provides an introduction to the Marianist value of "**adaptation to change**" and it does it through actual work in the field.

Upon successful completion of their internship students should be able to:

1. Describe four aspects of "what's needed to be a good work team member."
2. Articulate at least three skills needed in the field.
3. Create a descriptive resume entry that explains what they did in their internship and how it fits in the media landscape.

Note: These measurable course outcomes are to be included in your final reflection piece submitted post internship. Since you will be working on a job in the real world, be prepared to answer questions and take instruction. These will help you meet the measurable outcomes. The better you do, the more likely you will be to get a good grade, a good reference and possibly even a job offer. You can seek support from other students who have completed or are working on an internship at any time.

Attendance

Attendance for your one-on-one meetings with the professor is mandatory. IF you have a conflict, you must email the professor IN ADVANCE and SCHEDULE an alternative meeting time that week. Failure to attend the meeting or communicate a missed meeting will result in the penalty of the reduction of your final grade by a letter.

For your internship, you are expected to show up to do the work, on time, participate in discussions and carry your share of the load.

Academic integrity

Fabrication, plagiarism and cheating will not be tolerated. Collaboration on individual assignments or extensive rewriting done by a classmate will be considered cheating. Lifting information from the Internet or any other published work without attribution is also considered plagiarism.

Fabrication, plagiarism and cheating will result in an automatic 0 for that assignment, and there is the possibility of harsher penalties for final grade in the class.

Credit-hour policy

This is a three-credit-hour course requiring at least **135 clock hours** of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are expected to spend about:

- 120 hours at your internship (minimum)
- 15 hours working on professional development (as directed by the professor)

TOTAL = 135 hours

GRADING

Your on-the-internship mentor will evaluate you based on 10 work aspects: timeliness, knowledge of task, ability to work undirected, presentation and more. He or she will rate you A through F on each area. Your professor will average them, grade your self-reflection paper, assess your professional development and weekly reports, and issue your grade.

85% of your grade will be determined by your mentor's assessment of your work during your internship.

5% of your grade will be determined by your self-reflection due at the end of your internship

10% of your grade will be determined by your accounting of your professional development (resume, cover letter, LinkedIn, job applications, and more) and your weekly reports (due in Canvas by 11:59 p.m. each Sunday)

Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

1. Education for formation in faith
2. Provide an integral, quality education
3. Educate in family spirit
4. Educate for service, justice and peace
5. Educate for adaptation and change

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Olelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Olelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Olelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Olelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Olelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school.

Attendance Policy

The following attendance policy is from the 2019-2020 Academic Catalog (p. 54-55). Faculty members should also check with their divisions for division-specific guidelines.

Students are expected to regularly attend all courses for which they are registered. Students should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevents them from attending class and make an arrangement to complete missed assignments. Notification may be done by emailing the instructor's Chaminade email address, calling the instructor's campus extension, or by leaving a message with the instructor's division office. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade.

Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of classes may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Students with disabilities who have obtained accommodations from the Chaminade University of Honolulu Tutor Coordinator may be considered for an exception when the accommodation does not materially alter the attainment of the learning outcomes.

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. When illness or personal reasons necessitate continued absence, the student should communicate first with the instructor to review the options. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

Academic Conduct Policy

From the 2019-2020 Undergraduate Academic Catalog (p. 39):

General Student Rights (Student Handbook, page 6)

1. Students have the right to pursue educational, recreational, social, cultural, and residential activities within the basic philosophies, goals, and guidelines of Chaminade University.
2. Students have the right not to be discriminated against in employment or educational pursuits based upon the student's religious affiliation, gender, sexual orientation, skin color, ethnic or racial background, national origin, age, physical or mental challenges, marital status, change in marital status, pregnancy, or parenthood.
3. Students have the right to pursue educational endeavors free of harassment of any kind.
4. Students have the right to organize and join associations to promote interests held in common with other students within the limits of university policy and our Catholic, Marianist values.

5. Students have the right to services of the faculty, staff, and administrative officers of Chaminade University.
6. Students have the right to fair and impartial academic evaluations.
7. Students have the right to have the university maintain and protect the confidential status of their education, student conduct, and health records (for exceptions, see Privacy & Confidentiality in the DISCRIMINATION AND HARASSMENT PROCEDURES AND RESOURCE GUIDE)
