**University Course Catalog Description**

Explores the ethical dimensions of leadership in complex organizations. Through critical analysis and real-world case studies, students examine moral decision-making, ethical frameworks, and the responsibilities of leaders in diverse contexts. Emphasis is placed on integrity, accountability, and leading ethically amid diverse stakeholder interests, cultural contexts, and rapidly changing environments.

- Carefully analyze and synthesize material and ideas borrowed from sources. In addition, the sources of the borrowed material should be correctly acknowledged to avoid plagiarism (see Plagiarism).
- Written assignments should adhere to current APA formatting guidelines.

### Academic Honesty/Integrity

Academic integrity is an essential aspect of all learning, scholarship, and research. It is one of the values regarded most highly by academic communities throughout the world. Violations of the principle of academic honesty are extremely serious and will not be tolerated.

Students are responsible for promoting academic integrity at Chaminade by not participating in any act of dishonesty and by reporting any incidence of academic dishonesty to an instructor or to a University official. Academic dishonesty may include theft of records or examinations, alteration of grades, and plagiarism, in addition to more obvious dishonesty.

Sanctions for academic dishonesty will be determined by the instructor. Depending on the nature and severity, the matter may be addressed by the Director and if warranted, the Dean of the College. Possible outcomes may include a grade reduction on an assignment, failure of the course, or dismissal from the program or the University.

Violations of Academic Integrity: Violations of the principle include, but are not limited to:

- Cheating: Intentionally using or attempting to use unauthorized materials, information, notes, study aids, or other devices in any academic exercise.

- Fabrication and Falsification: Intentional and unauthorized alteration or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise. Falsification is a matter of inventing or counterfeiting information for use in any academic exercise.
- Multiple Submissions: The submission of substantial portions of the same academic work for credit (including oral reports) more than once without authorization.
- Plagiarism: Intentionally or knowingly presenting the work of another as one's own (i.e., without proper acknowledgment of the source).
- Abuse of Academic Materials: Intentionally or knowingly destroying, stealing, or making inaccessible library or other academic resource materials.
- Complicity in Academic Dishonesty: Intentionally or knowingly helping or attempting to help another to commit an act of academic dishonesty.
- Generating written, visual, or oral content that was not created by the student.

Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to:

- Copying or borrowing liberally from someone else's work without his/her knowledge or permission; or with his/her knowledge or permission and turning it in as your own work.
- Copying of someone else's exam or paper.
- Allowing someone to turn in your work as his or her own.
- Not providing adequate references for cited work.
- Copying and pasting large quotes or passages without properly citing them.

While AI technologies can be useful tools for research and learning, the Academic Honesty policies apply when using these technologies. The use of AI is not permitted to compose essays or produce content for assignments and exams. Students should give proper credit to sources when using information obtained through AI tools or other sources. It is essential that we uphold academic integrity while fostering a culture of creativity and critical thinking.

### **Disability Access**

**Credit Hour Policy**

This is a three-credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are anticipated to spend 50 hours of reading materials and videos, 30 hours researching and developing the three case scenarios, 33 hours researching and developing the reflections, 5 hours developing responses to the discussion threads, and 17 hours researching and developing the signature assignment.

**Attendance Policy**

Students are expected to actively engage and participate in their registered courses. In case of illness or other extenuating circumstances preventing attendance, students should notify their instructors and arrange to complete any missed assignments. Failure to meet attendance requirements may lead to a grade reduction, withdrawal from the course, or course failure. Instructors will specify and enforce expectations for online participation and submission of assignments according to the course design.

Excused absences are granted only in exceptional circumstances, supported by evidence provided by the student to the instructor. Students should notify their instructors when a situation prevents class participation and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notifying the instructor about an absence is courteous, but does not guarantee the absence will be excused.

Unexcused non-participation in a course, equivalent to more than one week of the term, may result in a grade reduction.
