University Course Catalog Description

Students probe the nature of human experience and religious meaning, with special attention given to experience of the Judeo-Christian God. Contemporary Catholic-Christian faith is systematically analyzed in terms of its core concepts, values and visions. This study addresses the question and critique of God in the modern world and surveys contemporary theology in a spirit that is Catholic, Christian and Ecumenical. Offered every semester. This course fulfills the lower division Religious Studies General Education Core requirement.

Course Overview

Students will study the theological foundations of Christianity from a contemporary and dynamic Roman Catholic perspective, investigating concepts fundamental to formulating a systematic faith-vision within the context of a diverse and multi-cultural society. Central themes include the human openness to transcendence, the experience of the Judeo-Christian God, the project of theology, the community called church and the sacraments it celebrates, ecumenism and interreligious dialogue, moral theology, and Catholic social teaching.

Marianist Values

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Olelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Olelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Olelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Olelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Olelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

1. Correlate how the sacramental understanding of God is evident in human experience.
2. Describe the meaning of Jesus as foundational for the Christian response to human existence, human choices, and social justice.
3. Explain the main themes of the relationship between humanity and God as expressed in the Judeo-Christian understanding of God.

Course Prerequisites

RE 205: The Christian God and Human Experience is an introductory-level course designed to expose students to the fundamentals of Christian doctrinal beliefs and practices in the Roman Catholic tradition through a variety of media and experiences. No previous experience of the study of religion or theology in any confessional tradition or religious orientation is required or presumed. Furthermore, students will never be asked to adopt as their own any of the theological ideas and concepts contained within this course. Students who possess basic

technological capabilities consistent with university-level learning meet or exceed the necessary skills requisite for success in this course. Assessment and Participation Expectations

This course endeavors to investigate the major themes of Roman Catholic theology in a way that is dynamic, interactive, and multi-experiential. To that end it enlists five types of learning activities:

1. *Analysis and Evaluation*. A variety of selected texts will introduce each module's thematic content. Students will recount their process of analyzing the assigned readings, noting points of interest and evaluating them for saliency and relevance.
2. *Synthesis and Comparison*. Sense-engaging learning experiences – typically an excursion and/or film – will deepen immersion into the module theme. Students will synthesize and compare their experience with the thematic material contained in the texts, observing the relationship between theory and praxis.
3. *Dialogue*. Students will nuance and broaden their learning through dialogue with others about themes from the module. Interlocutors will be others in proximity: friends, families, community members, coworkers, and the like.
4. *Create*. The study of each theme will culminate with an activity prompt intended to develop and inspire a student's sense of awe, creativity, and imagination as they relate to the topic at hand.
5. *Quiz*. Modules 3 and 4 will feature multiformat quizzes (multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, short essay) designed to help a student evaluate their academic progress and promise early in the course. Points earned from these quizzes will be added to that module's tally.

Each type of learning activity will account for approximately 20% of one's final grade. Students will demonstrate satisfactory participation by completing all module assignments before progressing to a subsequent module. All activity prompts will be accompanied by a detailed rubric illustrating standards of academic excellence.

Grading Scale

Letter grades are given in all courses except those taken for credit/no credit, to be interpreted as follows:

- A Outstanding scholarship and an unusual degree of intellectual initiative
- B Superior work done in a consistent and intellectual manner
- C Average grade indicating a competent grasp of subject matter
- D Inferior work of the lowest passing grade, not satisfactory for fulfillment of prerequisite course work
- F Failed to grasp the minimum subject matter; no credit given

Grades of "Incomplete"

A student may submit a written petition to the instructor for an incomplete. The option to grant or deny an incomplete needs the approval of the Dean. If approved, the student will receive an extension of 30 days during which all outstanding requirements must be completed. Students seeking an incomplete must hold at least a passing grade, have completed a majority of the work of the course, and have an unavoidable and compelling reason why the remainder of the work cannot be completed on schedule.
