AI may be used as a learning support tool—not as a writing tool.

Prohibited Use

Students may not use generative AI tools to:

- Write full or partial drafts of assignments, reflections, discussions, or papers
- Rewrite or paraphrase AI-generated content and submit it as their own work
- Generate analysis, arguments, or conclusions in place of the student’s own thinking
- Create citations or references without independently verifying accuracy

Submitting AI-generated writing as original work constitutes academic dishonesty.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment.
