## Course Objectives:

In this course you will have the opportunity to improve your listening and speaking skills in preparation for immersion into the regular academic environment.

- Students will improve their listening comprehension ability through the use of recorded audio materials containing everyday language spoken by native speakers of English in various settings.

- 3) Through small groups and class discussions, students will have the opportunity to share their own views and opinions on topics presented in class.
- 4) Through individual oral presentations, the students will be able to practice speaking in front of an audience.

#### Course Requirements:

Moreover, it will help the people around the student feel comfortable. This is very important for all of us in an international setting like Chaminade.
