University Course Catalog Description and Overview

These discussion groups for first-year students are led by a core faculty. Students discuss topics related to professional psychology and the development of a professional identity. The faculty leading the group helps students with academic and field training planning, general consultation on problems or difficulties in the program, and questions emerging during the student's first-year academic experience.

3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change ('Āina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Program Learning Outcomes: HSPP Aims and Competencies

The Hawai'i School of Professional Psychology at Chaminade University of Honolulu's clinical psychology doctoral program's aim is to educate and train students employing a practitioner-scholar model so that they will be able to function effectively as clinical psychologists. To ensure that students are adequately prepared, the curriculum is designed to provide for the meaningful integration of psychological science, theory, and clinical practice. The clinical psychology program at the Hawai'i School of Professional Psychology is designed to emphasize the development of knowledge, skills, and attitudes essential in the training of health service psychologists who are committed to the ethical provision of quality, evidence based services to diverse populations and who are able to apply multiple theoretical perspectives to clinical issues.

The Hawai'i School of Professional Psychology at Chaminade University of Honolulu's clinical psychology doctoral program subscribes to the American Psychological Association (APA) Standards of Accreditation. As such, students are expected to establish an identity in and orientation to health service psychology by acquiring the necessary discipline-specific knowledge and profession-wide competencies. Upon completion of the PSYD degree in clinical psychology, students will be able to:

1. Apply ethical and legal standards relevant to the practice of clinical psychology, including professional ethics that guide professional behavior.
2. Apply professional communication and interpersonal skills, to include the utilization of clear, informed, and well-integrated communication, as well as effective interpersonal skills across settings.
3. Apply professional values and attitudes across settings, including self-reflective practice and openness to supervision and feedback.
4. Apply awareness of individual and cultural diversity, including knowledge of theoretical models and diversity research that serve to guide the application of diversity competence.
5. Articulate and integrate the history and systems of psychology as well as the basic areas in scientific psychology, including affective, biological, cognitive, developmental, psychopharmacological, and sociocultural aspects of behavior.
6. Conduct science in psychology, applying psychometrics, statistical analyses, and quantitative and qualitative research methods.
7. Competently perform psychological assessments, including the ability to administer, interpret, integrate, and convey results of psychological tests.
8. Competently perform clinical interventions, including case formulation, theoretical conceptualization, developing and applying evidence-based treatment plans, and evaluating treatment effectiveness in work with clients.
9. Apply knowledge of consultation models and practices, including interprofessional and interdisciplinary skills in consultative services.
10. Articulate supervision models and practices, including areas of ethics and potential conflicts.
11. Apply the Marianist values, through acts of community service, justice, and peace.

Course Learning Outcomes

1. Students will prepare for their new roles as graduate students by reviewing program, university, and degree expectations/requirements and by preparing for future writing, presenting, collaboration, and peer support experiences. (Competency 2)
2. Students will develop self-reflection, self-management, and self-care skills to address academic, professional, and general life stressors. (Competency 3)

3. Students will develop their awareness of diversity issues in clinical psychology. (Competency 4)

Course Requirements

Course Requirements in Relation to Credit Hours: This is a one-credit hour course requiring 45 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this doctoral-level course are anticipated to spend a minimum of 15 hours in class. The additional 30+ hours outside of classes are anticipated to equal 1-2 hours per week on course readings and class preparation, and 1-2 hours per week of work on future assignments (e.g., presentations, projects, papers, exams).

Attendance/Participation: Students are expected to attend every class, arrive on time, complete all assigned readings, exhibit professional and ethical behavior, and actively participate in class discussions. Unexcused absences, tardiness, unprofessional and/or unethical behavior, and/or lack of preparation/participation may result in a reduction of the overall score for the course or remediation as assigned by the instructor. More than two absences may result in loss of credit for the course.

APA Publication Manual Modules: These are self-paced, asynchronous course modules that students

must successfully complete by the end of the term. For the Fall course, students must successfully pass two modules: 1) Writing style and grammar, and 2) Bias-free language. Students will submit proof (e.g., copies, screenshots) of their module completions.

Professional Development Plan: Students are to write a one-page, double-spaced, APA-formatted paper detailing their professional development plan. The student will orally present their reflection paper to the class.

Diversity Reflection Paper and Presentation: Students are to write a one-page, double-spaced, APA formatted reflection paper based in part on the assignments thus far. The first prompt is: Describe how your current diversity awareness can be both detrimental and beneficial in working with a client. The second half of the paper is your reflection on how your presentation (and the client's perception of it) can affect your work with the client.

Curriculum Vitae (CV): Students will finalize their CV for upcoming practicum applications.

Mock Interview: As part of your professional preparation, you will complete a video-recorded virtual mock interview with the instructor. This required assignment is designed to help you develop confidence, clarity, and professionalism in interview settings that are encountered for diagnostic, intervention, and pre-doctoral internship placements. The student will be asked to articulate their clinical understanding, discuss relevant experiences, and respond to questions that assess their critical thinking and applied knowledge. The focus will be on effective communication of ideas, demonstration of interview preparedness, and presentation as a professional candidate.

Minimum Competencies

This course requires satisfactory completion of multiple elements (i.e., APA Publication Modules, Professional Development Plan, Diversity Paper and Presentation, CV, Mock Interview). Credit for the course will not be given until each element is successfully completed (i.e., a student cannot pass the course if an element does not meet minimum criteria).

Instructional Contact and Credit Hours

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in a minimum of 45 hours of engagement, regardless of varying credits, duration, modality, or degree level. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one

semester. Terms that have alternative lengths, such as 10-week terms, should have an equivalent amount of faculty instruction and out-of-class student work to meet each credit hour. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit. The number of engagement hours may be higher, as needed to meet specific learning outcomes. The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

Course Policies

Instructor and Student Communication: Questions for this course can be emailed to the instructor. Online, in-person, and phone conferences can be arranged. Response time is up to 2 days.

Cell phones, tablets, and laptops: Out of consideration for your classmates, please set your cell phone to silent mode during class. Students are encouraged to bring laptops or tablets to class as the instructor will assign online activities and readings that will require the use of a laptop or tablet. Assessment for Student Work:

With the goal of continuing to improve the quality of educational services offered to students, Chaminade University conducts assessments of student achievement of course, program, and institutional learning outcomes. Student work is used anonymously as the basis of these assessments, and the work you do in this course may be used in these assessment efforts.

Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. Student should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevent them from attending class, and they should arrange to obtain missed information and complete missed assignments. With the condensed nature of the 8-week terms, missing class one day (e.g., 6-hours of class) would be equivalent to two absences in a 16-week term.

It is anticipated that in the course of students' graduate education in clinical psychology, they will have emotional reactions to class topics and discussions. Self-disclosure is considered voluntary and at the discretion of the student. Additionally, it is expected that peers be mindful and respectful of disclosures of others, keeping shared information confidential.

Therefore, using artificial intelligence (AI) and automated writing tools is *not permitted* for program submissions and will be considered academic dishonesty.

Technology: A laptop with the following technology may be required in order to complete courses in the Clinical Psychology program: at least Windows 10 (for PCs), at least Mac OS X 10.5.8 (for Macs); a current antivirus program; the current Microsoft Office (PowerPoint and Word) and Adobe Acrobat; a standard web browser; and an internet or broadband connection with speed and connectivity to support internet searches and video conferencing. Most courses are paperless, but a printer/scanner may also be required.
