COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course, you will be learning essential French grammar and will develop a manageable vocabulary, with equal development of speaking, writing, reading and listening comprehension. Through practice in class and with the aid of audio and video programs, you will learn to communicate in every day situations. You will gain an awareness and appreciation for French culture and its influence in the world.

Objectives

Your progress will develop and be evaluated according to your pronunciation abilities, your understanding and use of basic grammatical patterns and vocabulary, and your knowledge of the cultural concepts presented in the first half of C'est ca! Essentials of French. These abilities include:

- 1. hearing, speaking, reading and writing French in class and for homework assignments;
- 2. asking and answering questions in class with instructor and other students;
- 3. making oral presentations, alone or with partners;
- 4. writing as a response to oral questions on tests and in workbook;
- 5. demonstrating knowledge of grammar, vocabulary and comprehension of spoken French by answering questions in class and on tests and final exam;
- 6. acquiring cultural awareness through realia, textbook readings, video, internet, audio program and participation in extracurricular activities.

Content

French 101 will cover the first half, chapters 1 through 8 of C'est ça! Essentials of French text, accompanying audio cassettes, workbook, instructor lectures and handouts. Each text chapter introduces thematic vocabulary, short dialogs and narratives reflecting real-life situations, and clearly-explained grammar presentations in English. You will actively use these new structures and vocabulary by practicing communicative exercises in the text, workbook and instructor handouts. You will interact with other students through engaging activities designed to encourage your own creativity. French culture is presented through authentic readings, realia, video and instructor presentations. The video is tied directly to the textbook, presenting scenes shot on location in France and cultural vignettes containing authentic footage from a variety of French and Francophone sources.

Procedures

The language of instruction is French. All five skills (listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural awareness) are developed; acquisition is achieved by the ACTIVE use of new structures and vocabulary. Each chapter will take approximately 2 classes to complete. The schedule may have to be adjusted according to the progress made by the students. Therefore the class schedule (l'empoi du temps) is tentative. There will be a test given at the end of each chapter.

Student Requirements

A. The audio cassette tape program is coordinated with the workbook ("cahier") which accompanies the textbook. Listening, repeating and completing oral and written workbook exercises is the main part of your homework and helps you review and practice the language presented in class. Chapter tests (Contrôles) will have written and listening activities similar to those in the workbook and text. It is your responsibility to review the sections that explain or practice the concepts that are covered in class. It is best to do this as we go along, doing the sections in the workbook for homework the same day as they were covered in class. The "cahier" is due on the day of the chapter exam. It should be self-corrected in a contrasting ink color, by using the answer key at the back of the "cahier". Your "cahier" will be graded on your corrections, not on your initial answers. I am concerned that you did the work and corrected your mistakes, that you did NOT just copy the answers. I will not correct these for you. The essay exercises (answers not provided in answer key) may be marked and graded by meand returned for you to correct. You may turn it back in and raise your grade.

- B. Tests will be based on the information presented in the text, the audio tapes and workbook ("cahier"), and the instructor's materials. There will be a test after chapters Préliminaire, 1, 2, 3, 5,6,7 and 8; lowest score will be dropped. There will be no makeup tests. Absence from tests will be excused only if you provide written proof of the reason for your absence, preferably <u>before</u> the test.
- C. Attendance and preparations are mandatory. Come to class prepared! Study the grammar and vocabulary carefully. Class time will be used to drill the grammar, not to hear explanations which could be easily gleaned from the English-written text. Language learning is cumulative, and it is impossible to "cram" at the last minute. It is in class that you will be able to develop your listening comprehension and speaking skills. Expect that days of unexcused absences for the semester will drop you at least one letter grade. Part of your oral grade is based on your preparation and ability to converse with others in class.
- D. LATE WORK Cahiers, compositions and homework WILL NOT be accepted late. If you fall behind, you hold back the entire class. If you are absent, refer to the syllabus and class schedule AND ask a classmate for assignments which may not be on the syllabus. It is a good idea to have the phone number of at least one classmate.
- E. FRENCH CULTURE/EXTRA CREDIT For development of awareness of French culture, you are encouraged to engage in a cultural activity from the following suggestions: a) Alliance Française French Immersion Day (to be announced) or conversation groups; b) French film, requires dated movie ticket or rental receipt; c) Exploration of French sites on Internet; d) Prepare a French dish and present it to the class; e) French Club (Cercle Français) activity: f) Original idea to be cleared by instructor. The culture activities will count as extra credit. A written paragraph of 8-10 sentences describing the activity must be submitted; try to write at least half in French. You may present it to the class 1.
