- <u>Text</u>: Salter, Christopher and et al. 1998. <u>Essentials of World Regional Geography.</u> Second Edition. Saunders College Publishing.
- <u>Course Description:</u> Geography of world's states and major cultural regions; emphasis on geographic aspects of contemporary economic, social and political conditions. Each region will be examined in terms of its underlying physical,cultural,economic and political background.

<u>Course Objectives:</u> At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- * understand geographic concepts and theories used to explain world patterns of distributions of population, culture and economic activities
- * understand spatial differentiation of human patterns on the landscape
- * recognize the location of world states and major cities

<u>Class Attendance and Participation:</u> Attendance will be taken at each class meeting. The class starts promptly at 5:30 p.m. <u>Tardiness or leaving class early will be</u> <u>regarded as an absence.</u> Only written notes from a doctor or your commanding officer, on his letter head including his telephone number and signed personally by him; hospital release form; or a obituary of an immediate family member are normally accepted excused absences. You are allowed one absence(each meeting is four hours). Each absence after that, 25 points will be deducted from your total course points.

Exams and Quizzes: There will be three exams during the semester. The final (third exam) will not be comprehensive and will cover only the last part of the course after Exam No.2. The exams will have two sections, the first section will have objective questions made up of multiple choice, true-false and matching questions. The second section will be made up of map location. Make-up exams and quizzes are strongly discouraged! (If you are allowed to make-up a exam, depending on the reason for missing the exam, and the written documentation - it will be a very difficult. exam!)

Strong emphasis in the COUISE is placed on map location of countries and cities. There will be a map location section on the exams, plus six map location quizzes. Practice maps will be provided and the same maps will be used on the quizzes and exams.

STUDENT PROJECT: To help you get an in depth look at the contemporary news of one of the course realms, each student is expected to pick one of the realms (except for North America) and collect articles, from <u>at least two</u> periodicals (newspaper or magazine) over a three month period. (no computer printed articles). The articles are to be mounted and put in a binder. <u>Each article</u> <u>must have the name of the periodical, date and the page number</u> <u>on it.</u>Near the middle of the third month, a two to five page summary is to be typewritten on the articles collected. Proper use of English, grammar and spelling are expected! DUE ON SEPTEMBER 3.

Student Project (Report) (Zero to 50 points)

To help you get an in depth look at the contemporary news in one of the 7 course realms (besides North America), each student is to pick <u>ONE of the realms</u> shown on the map on pages 8 and 9 in your textbook and collect articles from <u>at least two</u> <u>periodicals</u> (newspapers or magazines) over the next two and a half month period. For example, if you are to use newspapers, go through them <u>daily</u> and pick out any article that is about some aspect of the realm you have chosen. Mount the articles and include the <u>name of the newspaper</u> or magazine it is from, the date and page number.

During the last week in August, write a short two to five page summary for the articles you have collected. The report is to be typed, spell-checked and double spaced.

The report is due the evening of <u>September 3</u>

The style and format of your report should follow those used in Chaminade University of Honolulu, English courses, for <u>title page</u>, text and footnotes.
