Course description: This survey of world history from 1500 to the present examines historical movements, events, and personalities in a variety of cultures and time periods and looks for ongoing trends that influence our lives today.

Text: McKay, Hill, Buckler, A History of World Societies II, fourth edition.

Assignments:

 You are expected to read the chapters assigned from the textbook and to formulate one or two questions on the reading before class. You are encouraged to participate in class or group discussions, and you will complete some short writing assignment -- a quiz, impromptu essay, short oral report or the like -- during each class period.
You are expected to choose two books from the supplemental reading list and write a two-to-three-page book report on each. Your report should identify the thesis or main theme(s) of the book, show how the author develops the thesis, and consider the book's pros and cons.

3. You are expected to take two exams, a mid-term and a final. You will be given five or six exam questions to study in advance, two of which will appear on the exam. You will answer one of them in essay form.

Grading: Assignments will be weighted as follows:

Midterm and final exams:	25 points possible on each
Book reports:	10 points possible on each
Daily assignments:	5 points possible on each

Attendance: You are expected to attend all classes unless you are called away by military duty, illness, or other emergency. Please let me know in advance if you will be absent. Make-up work can be arranged.
