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Course description: This survey of world history from 1500 to the present examines historical ideas, movements, events, and personalities in a variety of cultures and time periods and looks for ongoing trends that influence our lives today.

Text: Philip J. Adler, World Civilizations, Volume 2, Since 1500, 2nd edition.

Assignments: You are expected to:

(1) read the chapters assigned from the textbook and to formulate one or two questions on the reading before class. You are encouraged to participate in class or group discussions, and you may be asked to complete some short assignment — a quiz, impromptu essay, short oral report or the like — during each class period. (2) choose two books from the supplemental reading list and write a two-to-three-page book report on each. Your report should identify the historical context of the book, briefly summarize the narrative, and then focus on a particular theme or facet of the book that interests you. Be prepared to give an impromptu oral presentation based on your book report.

(3) take three exams, two mid-terms and a final, based on the lectures and the readings. For the midterms, you will be given five or six exam questions to study in advance, three of which will appear on the exam. In class, you will be asked to answer two of the three alternatives in an essay of about two pages each. The final exam will follow the same format for the essays but will include an additional section, format to be announced.

Grading: Each exam will be worth 100 points and each book report 50 points, so the maximum score possible for the course is 400 points.

Attendance: You are expected to attend all classes and complete all exams and reports on time unless you are called away by military duty, illness, or other emergency. Please let me know in advance if you will be absent.
