COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Introduction to drafting techniques and tools with emphasis on accurate floor plans and elevation drawings as well as an introduction to isometric drawing. The course will focus on development of communication skills in the production of construction documents and the integration of interiors space planning. Techniques to increase creativity will be explored through theories of space planning concepts, programming, analysis and utilization. The work will include several projects of increasing intensity and difficulty designed to prepare the student for the professional office environment. Discussions will be held on the legal importance of accuracy and completion; the interaction between the designer and the construction industry; and the ramifications of the construction documents on the successful design project.

GRADING:
