SYLLABUS:

COURSE CONTENT:

This course is designed to give the student a basic understanding of the history and development of furnishings, textiles and room design and how they relate to architecture. The student will be given a chronological overview of the history of these developments with an emphasis on Twentieth Century furniture design, furniture designers and interior design. The course will be based on a required text. The material will be covered by the lectures, the text, videos, handouts and field trips.

GOALS:

At the end of the semester students will be expected to:

1. Be familiar with the various periods of design.

2. Be familiar with and apply the appropriate vocabulary of terms relating to the history of design and the development of styles.

Comprehend the chronology of design and the relationships of styles to each other.

4. Apply the course content to contemporary Interior Design.

EXPECTATIONS:

Attendance is mandatory. Students are expected to be prompt and to be present throughout the entire class period. NO CELL PHÓNES ARE ALLÓWED. Since the course content is concerned with a historical overview it is important that you do not miss a class unless it is absolutely necessary.
