Course Description: This course will be an introduction to the field of anthropology, the study of humankind and focus on the subfield of cultural anthropology. Our world consists of diverse cultures, many often misunderstood, causing conflict and problems among those of different Culture is defined as a set of concepts, ideas, values, beliefs, attitudes and learned behaviors shared by a group of people or a population. The course will present material that will allow the student to reason why there is such a diversity of cultures, one of which is the influence of the physical environment and the process of adaptation to such an environment. The course will cover topics of biological anthropology, sociolinguistics, marriage and family, subsistence, culture change, sex roles, fieldwork, ecology, futuristics and more.

## Course Objective:

To let the student have a deeper and wider perspective of the world's peoples and their diverse culture. In hope that somehow, this understanding will lead to friendship and goodwill and to world peace. An anthropological view will allow the student to better appreciate the richness of humans and their cultures.

Attendance is necessary for obtaining a good grade. The term paper will be 6-10pp, on a topic pertaining to anthropology. The midterm and final will cover materials from lecture and readings and will be a mixture of matching and short answer essay.
