Format:


After the first meeting, students will read the upcoming chapter (introduced by the

instructor) and do the assigned activities in the chapter. When class meets the instructor will explain the current topic in depth and lead discussion and other activities designed to reinforce critical thinking skills. Rather than having cumulative comprehensive exams, students will have weekly guizzes covering the current topic.

Course Requirements:

- Attendance is necessary for the entirety of each meeting in order to complete the course (unexpected conflicts such as hospitalization or deployment, will be excused on a case by case basis with proper documentation, according to Chaminade University policy). Excused absences will not result in a loss of points if a student turns in the chapter assignment and signs up to make up the missed quiz on the last class day. Missing assignments/quizzes will result in a substantial loss of points.
- Grading will be based upon satisfactory completion of weekly *class work* (including • short exercises and essays) and homework (including exercises and finding news articles) as well as the average of the student's weekly guiz grades. Students can retake their lowest quiz on the last day of class. The class-work and homework are pass/fail, with one grace period for one late assignment and one grace period for one incomplete assignment (if submitted the following week there is no grade loss for that one assignment).
- Note: Students will need weekly access to newspapers, magazines and/or internet • news sources.
