INTRODUCTION/DESCRIPTION

International Relations-World Politics is at an epochal turning point: the demise of the Soviet Union, apparent end of the Cold War, possible turn to national-international anarchy or a New World Order, the gradual move into space, and, of course, the coming of the new Millennium, are all revolutionary changes in the world arena. To understand this process of political evolution, we shall ask three main questions. First, what is International Relations-World Politics (IR/WP), and what does it consist of: what persons, events, processes and institutions do we need be aware of and understand? Second, how do we understand IR/WP; that is, what mental processes of thought and feeling (analytical, holistic) must we employ to achieve deep insight? Third, and most importantly, how and where do we place ourselves in the progression and meaning of world affairs? Thus, the course is designed to: (1) help you become aware of International Relations-World Politics--persons, events, forces, processes, institutions, issues and controversies; (2) help you gain the necessary skills to interpret and form your own view of IR/WP--its past, present and possible future; and (3) develop your ability to visualize your own place in the great pageant of world politics--in terms of your origins, present situation and desired future. Thus, we will cover international history, major concepts of politics and world affairs, fundamental processes of war and peace and the impending shift from World Politics to Space Politics.

CLASS OBJECTIVES: Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able:

*To acquire a fundamental awareness of International Relations-World Politics--persons, events, processes, institutions.

- *To develop their own analytical-holistic thought process and to formulate their own conception of IR/WP.
- *To visualize themselves as world political beings and their place in world affairs.
- *To communicate effectively, both orally and in writing, about International Relations-World Politics: its nature, content, seeming direction and their position in it.

CLASS FORMAT

The class will be an interactive, cooperative learning experience wherein both instructor and students participate and grow. The class will consist of a number of activities, including: lectures; multi-media events, such as videos and recordings; guest speakers; class discussions; a short-2 page--paper (required)/class presentation (optional, 5-10 minutes=5 extra points); a longer--5-7 page--course paper (to be approved by the instructor); a mid-term examination; and a final examination.

REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

Students are expected to attend class prepared to participate in activities/discussions by: being open minded/ready to think critically; reading/keeping abreast of the news; and completing class readings/assignments.
