# C. Paper (50 points, due April 13<sup>th</sup>)

Each student will select a topic that is of particular interest to them from one of the chapters in the textbook. After selecting a topic and discussing it with the instructor, each student should find a minimum of two articles on the topic. These articles can be from professional journals or from the internet. Your paper should be 2 to 3 pages in length (double spaced using 12 point font). The paper should include the following sections:

- I. <u>Introduction</u> one paragraph describing the topic and why you selected it.
- II. <u>Summary of the articles</u> the main ideas of the article, major findings reported, and how the information relates to information in the book.
- III. <u>Critical analysis</u> your opinions about the topic and the information that you have found.
