Course Requirements Grades for the course will be assigned based on the quality of student work as demonstrated by successful completion of the following requirements: A. Research Papers (4 @ 50 points each) = 200 points B. Quizzes (14 @ varies) = 397 points C. Final Exam (1 @ 100 points) = 103 points Total Points = 700

A. Research Papers (4 @ 50 = 200 points) Four research papers will be turned in for credit. Each paper will be worth a maximum of 50 points. The research papers are designed for you to examine research on a topic of interest that is related to 4 of the five sections of the textbook (no research paper is required for the first section of the book - chapters 1 & 2. For example, the first research paper, related to some aspect of Biological and Cognitive Development is due May 3 (see the course calendar for the due dates). As you read the two chapters on biological and cognitive development you may see the section on multiple intelligence (p. 130). You may say to yourself, "that sounds interesting, I think I will do some research on multiple intelligence so I can find out more about it." You would then do some research using the internet, books, journal articles, interviews, etc as the basis for your paper. You should write a three-page paper on your topic. You must use and cite at least three sources of information in your paper and on a reference page. Plagerism is a major new concern with the internet, so remember to cite sources of information including quotes and paraphrases. After you have completed your paper, copy and paste it into an email message. Please do not send attachments as I sometimes have difficulty opening them and I have gotten many viruses along with the attachments. The research papers will be graded regarding relevance to adolescent development, clarity and organization of the paper and your ideas, sources of information, and length. DO NOT SEND THE PAPERS MORE THAN TWO DAYS BEFORE THE DUE DATE AS I TRY TO READ THEM ALL AT ONCE AND IT IS EASIER TO FIND THEM IF THEY ARE ALL TOGETHER. To Send your papers: 1. On the course homepage click on the MAIL ICON. 2. When the email screen opens, click on the COMPOSE MAIL MESSAGE. 3. Click on the BROWSE button and select D Fryxell (PSY30490S03) 4. Click on DONE 5. Enter your last name and the assignment # on the subject line. 6. Copy and paste your paper into the message section. 7. Click send. 8. I try to get feedback to everyone on their paper within one week so be patient. B. Quizzes (14 @ varies by chapter = 397 points) Fourteen quizzes will be taken during the semester. The quizzes are multiple choice and based on information covered in the textbook. The quizzes are posted on the textbook website at http://highered.mcgraw-hill.com/sites/007249199x/ . After you complete the quizzes on the textbook website you will be able to send them to me by filling in the information at the end of the quiz. The quizzes for each week should be completed before the next week (i.e., the quiz for chapter one should be sent to me by April 19th). C. Final Exam (1 @ 103 points) The final exam is scheduled for June 14th at 1:00. The exam will be multiple choice and similar in format to the quizzes. There is not a study guide for the exam so you are required to have a good grasp of the material covered in the textbook. The room number for the exam will be posted around campus on the day of the exam.
