Course Description:

An introduction to the major theories and concepts in the study of Human Sexuality and Sexual Expression which will provide the student with a broad overview of a variety of the psychological aspects of sexual expression throughout the life span. Exploration of the psychological aspects of human sexuality and sexual expression will allow the student the opportunity to develop a better understanding of self and society.

Course Objectives:

The student will:

Demonstrate knowledge of the scientific method.

Demonstrate knowledge of the basic concepts and principles of human sexuality.

Demonstrate an understanding of the major factors affecting human sexuality and sexual expression.

Develop an appreciation of the processes by which human sexuality is studied, analyzed, and interpreted.

Demonstrate knowledge of cultural diversity in sexual expression. Be able to integrate knowledge about sexual expression into daily life so as to enrich one's understanding of self and others.

Expectations For Students:

A Paper

The instructor must approve your topic. The paper must be typed, double spaced, and 5-7 pages in length. You also need to enclose a bibliography and cite references. Be careful of grammar and spelling errors as you will lose points for them. Do not plagiarize!! Your paper will be due when the relevant chapter is covered in class. Your paper will be worth 100 points.

A Presentation:

You may chose a chapter in the text, that you feel comfortable talking about to the class. You will need to write out your presentation in advance because you will not be able to use your textbook during the presentation. The student will be required to share their impressions and experiences related to the chapter.

Class members are encouraged to join in the discussions and presentation and the instructor will make appropriate comments or add information as required. This portion of the class is meant to be lively and interesting. The presentations will allow students the opportunity to apply the information in each chapter to real life situations which will make our study of Psychology of Sexual Expression more meaningful. The presentations will also give the instructor insight into how much of the information the student is grasping and understanding. The presentation is worth 100 points.
