Course description: Counseling approaches and techniques used in helping relationships.

The course combines experiential and didactic instruction, giving the student an opportunity to

explore helping strategies and develop a philosophy of counseling.

Course objectives: At the end of this course students will be better able to explain the theoretical foundations of

applied counseling technique. They will be better able to choose clinical strategies based on client need, good practice, and ethics. They will be better able to formulate treatment plans, crisis management plans, and multi-discipline integrated service plans.

Course process: Course objectives will be met by way of didactic study of text materials, applied applications

through in-class role play, and process oriented growth through student interactions and investigations of intrapersonal and interpersonal events in the various communities in which

they live and work. Ethical, cultural, and diversity issues will be addressed/

Description of Assignments:

<u>Sensory Awareness Journal</u>: The purpose of this exercise is to help students become aware of and sensitive to the multiple bits of information inherent in verbal and non-verbal ways of being. Five entries are required for maximum credit; 2 points for each entry. *One typewritten page of self-reflection is to be turned in each week, unless otherwise indicated.*

APA Format Writing Project: The purpose of this project is to help students practice the specific components of APA format. Page formatting as well as writing style will be addressed. Areas to be practiced are Abstract Writing, Introduction Writing, Heading and Sub-Heading organization, Summary Writing, and Referencing. Points are earned by practicing the tasks as assigned. Two points are earned per topic for a total of ten points.

Class Group Project: The purpose of this project is to help students gain skills which are presently being used in hospital, school, and community mental health settings. Over the course of the term, the Group will come to resemble a multi-disciplinary team responsible for design of a well integrated treatment plan. Time will be allocated during class for the Group to work on their project. Although students may find it helpful to bring in outside reference material, this is meant to be an in-class project. The instructor will act in a consultant role. The instructor will provide background history on the "clients." Presentation on the last day of class, of the case and treatment plan is required to earn 20 points. If a student will be unable to attend the presentation, adequate input to the Group via e-mail, fax, phone call or written report is required. Note: Students can earn up to 10 points for group cooperation and up to 10 points for individual effort. Therefore remember students are graded as group members and as individuals.

In-Class Mid-term: The purpose of this project is to assess the didactic knowledge gained by the student. It is through this medium that the student's understanding of the theoretical underpinnings of clinical practice can be demonstrated. Questions will focus on the classic differences, similarities, and transition points of the theories presented in the text. There will be 10 multiple choice questions worth 2 points each, 10 fill-in-the-blank questions worth 2 points each, and 5 short answer questions worth 2 points each. Questions will be based on material presented in class.
