DESCRIPTION:

This course provides an introduction to the world's religious traditions. It introduces the basic philosophical tenets and religious practices of a diversity of religious systems. First, students explore the nature of religious studies and survey the varieties of religious experience. Next, taking an anthropological approach, they trace the historical roots and cultural adaptation of the world's religious traditions. Finally, it explores how these traditions are being understood and adapted in the contemporary period by people the world over to address issues of social concern. Through selected readings, video presentations, and fieldwork, students develop an informed appreciation of the varieties of religious belief and practice as they evolve in dynamic relationship strikingly different civilizations.

The course surveys Native American, African, Indian, Chinese, and Japanese religious traditions, as well as those that arose in the Middle East: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. In surveying these traditions, it examines issues of philosophical concern, religious expression, cultural adaptation, and psychology, with special reference to women's issues, ethics, social engagement, and ecumenical dialogue.

Regular class attendance, active participation in discussions, and completion of readings on time are expected. A series of short reflection papers (2 to 3 pages), quizzes, and a final paper (10-15 pages) are required to complete the course. Students are encouraged to bring their own background and experience to bear upon the perennial questions of the human experience. Last date for withdrawal from the class is March 2.
