- * to discuss various contemporary issues confronting our society and their ethical implications.

Class Format:

The course will utilize lecture, discussion, guest presentations, student presentations, reading, reflective writing and examinations. Students are required to be prepared for each class session through readings and assigned activities so that the most benefit may come from the learning experiences in class.
