Course Description

This course is an introduction to the New Testament literature within its socio-historical context. Students will examine the literature of the New Testament in relationship with the context in which was written, the late Judaism, Hellenistic and Roman periods and the intent of the authors in corresponding with their respective audiences. Previous biblical study is not required.

Textbooks

Course Requirements and Evaluation

1. Class attendance and participation (10% of grade);

You are expected to attend all 10 sessions. Classes will consist of lecture and discussion. If you miss a class, you are responsible for the material, which will include a written response to the required readings.

2. Two Quizzes (10% each of grade = 20% of grade);

The quizzes will be based on the material covered in class and in the readings. Quizzes will consist of multiple choice, fill-in the blank, and definitions. Quizzes and final exam are not cumulative.

3. Textual study paper and presentation (30% of grade);

The textual paper and presentation will be on a topic of your choice. You are expected to read the primary source (the scripture pericope(s)), your text, and a commentary or two on the scripture, or concordance if required. Suggested topics will be provided to you or you may choose one of your own with permission from the instructor. The paper will be a minimum of three pages (not including bibliography) and not to exceed 10 pages, with proper citations if you are quoting any source. Citations may be done one of three ways but must be consistent throughout the paper. (Footnotes, endnotes, in-text citation with Works Cited notation as an individual page). You will need to include a bibliography listing your sources.

4. Final exam: 2 parts

- a. take-home exam (20% of grade);
- b. in-class exam (20% of grade).

Final examination will be in two parts. The take-home portion will consist of essay questions. The in-class portion will include multiple choice questions, identify, and fill-in the blank – similar in style to the quizzes. It will not take the entire class period so we will have a lecture.
