COURSE #311 CHURCH HISTORY I: ORIGINS TO 16th CENTURY

TO 16th CENTURY FALL 2000 UNITY. EXAMINES THE ORIGINS AND

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SURVEY OF THE HISTORY OF THE CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY. EXAMINES THE ORIGINS AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE SPIRIT, EXPERIENCE AND TEACHINGS OF THIS COMMUNITY, AS WELL AS ITS SOCIAL, POLITICAL, ECONOMIC, AND CULTURAL INSTITUTIONS TO THE BEGINNINGS OF THE REFORMATION. OF PARTICULAR CONCERN WILL BE THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH AND THE JEWS, MONASTIC MOVEMENTS, DEVELOPMENT OF ECCLESIAL STRUCTURES, HIERARCHY, AND THEOLOGICAL INSIGHTS IN HISTORICAL CONTEXT.

GOAL:

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To present a foundational view and understanding of the origin and development of the Church through ancient and medieval times. Consideration will be given to significant events, ideas, conditions and personalities which together constitute the genesis and movement of the Christian community through the ages. Attention will be given to both secular and sacred spheres, with special focus on the interpenetration of their histories through the ages.

Objectives:

- 1) To present the various phases of church history with clarity and precision in a way that allows for sure and certain grasp of essential historical realities
- 2) To assist in correlation and integration of church history with other studies, religious and secular
- 3) To focus on alternative and sometimes conflictive theological visions and values at work within the universal Christian community, noting the presence and absence of particular theo-moral concerns in the various eras and epochs of ecclesial life
- 4) To highlight the multitude of stories which collectively comprise this period's history, with special focus on the formation of societies and states under church influence
- 5) To make study of these historical events, ideas, conditions and personalities "come alive" so as to be relevant to people living in "modern/post-modern" times

Requirements:

1) presence and participation in all scheduled classes for this course

- 2) completion of all assignments/projects as given throughout the course
- 3) satisfactory completion of all examinations during the semester

Recommendations:

1) notebook for recording information during class presentations and assigned readings

- 2) research and reading of extra materials relevant to the course
- 3) attentive and participative class presence to foster learning attitude and aptitude
