Course # 312 CHURCH HISTORY II: REFORMATION TO THE PRESENT Spring 2000

SURVEY OF THE HISTORY OF THE CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY FROM THE TIME OF THE REFORMATION TO THE PRESENT. EXAMINES THE HISTORICAL CONTEXT OF THE REFORMATION AND THE DEVELOPING TRADITIONS IN THE VARIOUS COMMUNITIES. EMPHASIZES THE ECUMENICAL MOVEMENT, DEVELOPING SOCIAL CONSCIOUSNESS, VATICAN II, AND THE COMPLEX RELATIONSHIP OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCHES TO SECULAR SOCIETY IN THE 20th CENTURY.

GOAL:

to present a developmental view of Christianity through the critical periods of Renaissance & Reformation, New World Mission & Age of Enlightenment, through times of religious war and social revolution, to the re-birth and re-direction of the church in the modern & post-modern eras. Consideration of such events in the dialogical course of 'history-church history' will weigh the impact of theologies old and new, as well as the contribution of Christian praxis or lack thereof.

Objectives:

- 1) to present the various phases of church history with clarity and precision in a way that allows for sure and certain grasp of essential historical realities
- 2) to make study of these historical events, ideas, conditions and personalities "come alive" so as to be relevant to people living in "modern/post-modern times"
- 3) to focus on alternative and sometimes conflictive theological visions and values at work within Christian communities through these centuries
- 4) to address the presence or absence of particular theo-moral concerns within scope of the various eras and epochs of ecclesial life under consideration
- 5) to assist in correlation and integration of church history with other studies, religious and secular

Requirements:

1) presence and participation in all scheduled classes for this course

2) completion of all assignments/projects as given throughout the course

a) assigned readings in text

b) paper: select any person or event pertinent to our course study and present a typed 5 page report due at the time of the last class [3 page summary on selected topic/1 page on reason for this selection/1 page

on contemporary correlation or connection] 3) satisfactory completion of all course examinations

Recommendations:

1) notebook for recording information during class presentations and assigned readings

2) research and reading of extra materials relevant to the course

3) attentive and participative class presence to foster learning attitude and aptitude
