INTRODUCTION AND DESCRIPTION:

Ethical problems and issues are both personal and social concerns. This course is designed to provide students with interdisciplinary conceptual frameworks to understand social ethics from the perspectives of religion, philosophy and sociology. Students will explore and analyze critically the contemporary ethical issues cross-culturally. This class will emphasize a multicultural approach to study and examine ethical systems and related social policies.

CLASS OBJECTIVE:

*to survey different case studies of ethical issues.

*to critically review the affect of religion on cultural and social change.

*to understand and apply different approaches to the study of issues involved in social ethics.

*to analyze factors related to problems and issues in social ethics.

*to examine various alternatives and possibilities to create ethical social policies.

CLASS FORMAT:

This class will be an interactive, cooperative learning experience for the students and the instructor. The format integrates lectures, small group discussions, student presentations, role plays, and debates. Students are encouraged and expected to actively participate in class activities. They are required to come to class with intensive reading to contribute to extensive discussion of the basic textbook and relevant videos.

REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING:

Students are required to be open minded in class discussion and to participate regularly in class activities. Each student is expected to carefully read the assigned chapter in the textbook and be prepared to discuss it for the class period of the assignment.
