This course will survey theories and methodologies of peace. The student will explore the area from the perspectives of the Catholic peace tradition, Buddhism, two founders of modern peace research, and the impact of feminist studies on peace and security studies. Offered alternate years. Prerequisites: RE 103, RE 200, or POL 111, or permission of instructor.

Course Objectives:

The primary objective of the course is to stimulate thoughtful reflection on the topic of peace. At the end of the course the student should have a basic understanding of the problematics of peace studies, its religious and philosophical presuppositions, its theories and practice.
