COURSE DESCRIPTION:

I have structured this course to provide an overview of some of the major issues and controversies found in the classical and modern literature on RACE.

We will explore moments in the historical development of the concept(s) of race, as well as the structures and processes of ethnicity, ethnic identity, prejudice, and minority-majority relations (focusing upon cross cultural systems of stratification and domination throughout history). Special attention will be placed on attempts to explain human/group variations (such as intelligence or physical/athletic skills) by appealing to the factor of race.

ORGANIZATION AND GRADES:

This course will attempt to interweave lectures and group discussions in an atmosphere of mutual respect.
