DESCRIPTION :

This course examines concepts and current theories of race and ethnic relations. The class will analyze the causes and results of racial and ethnic prejudices. The objective is to identify and understand the position of races and ethnic minority groups in the United States. The class discussion will also explore the effects of interracial and interethnic contacts.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

*learn about the interrelations among ethnic group in the United States.

*analyze the impacts of prejudice on the interaction of different racial and ethnic groups in the United States.

- *show respect and an open mind to different ideas and opinions from class members.
 - *turn in assignments on time.
 - *be responsible to cooperate and complete class/team projects on time.

GRADING:

The grading will be based on

- 1. Class attendance 10 pts.
- Class participation (including book chapter reports)
- Reflection journals 15 pts. (On three selected topics discussed in class)
 - 4. Mid term take-home exam 30 pts.
- 5. Research project 30 pts. (written report 20 pts. oral report 10 pts.)

CLASS PARTICIPATION:

Students will be assigned to read chapter(s) from the textbooks and to turn in the following on the day when they take a leading role in class discussion:

- a 1-2 page (typed double-spaced) summary of chapter(s) including
- 3 main points from the reading clearly stated in bullet or number format, and 3 analytical questions for class discussion.

RESEARCH PROJECT:

The purpose of the project is for students to creatively apply knowledge from classroom to real life experience. Students may choose a research topic relating to the problems and issues of ethnic relations in society. The research methodology includes survey, interviews, and a literature review.

The written report of the research should be within the range of 7-10 double-spaced typed pages. It will be due on the last day of the class when the oral report is given.
