Course Description

Spanish 101 is an introductory course to the Spanish language and the culture of its speakers. The purpose of this course is to facilitate the practical application of the language in everyday oral and written communication at the beginning novice level. Since the focus will be on basic communication skills, the class will be conducted in Spanish as much as possible.

Upon successful completion of Spanish 101, students should be able to speak and pronounce the language well enough to initiate and sustain some simple conversations with native speakers, accustomed to dealing with foreigners, on familiar topics of a personal or survival nature.

Course Objectives

Using learned material, students will be able to:

- ✓ Understand the instructions of the teacher;
- ✓ Greet, take leave, and use simple expressions of courtesy;
- \checkmark Engage in simple exchanges of personal information dealing with the self, family, and school;
- ✓ Ask and answer simple questions about basic preferences: food, personal possessions, entertainment, etc.;
- ✓ Ask and answer simple questions about personal state of being: physical and psychological;
- ✓ Make a short oral presentation about the self, family, classes and everyday subjects;
- ✓ Understand the main ideas of reading materials presented in class;
- Fill in blanks with specific grammatical forms or vocabulary words;
- ✓ Answer questions in writing, with short answers, in the target language;
- \checkmark Imitate appropriate gestures learned with expressions in the target language;
- Appreciate differences and similarities between native cultures and the target culture;
- Possess basic knowledge of the geography of the Spanish-speaking world and its peoples;
- √ Recognize differences in sound systems;
- √ Identify cognates;
- ✓ Understand that a language cannot be translated word for word.

Attendance

Regular attendance is expected at all classes and is, therefore, essential toward the successful completion of this course. If the student is / will be unable to attend class on a given day, it is his / her responsibility to contact the instructor via phone or e-mail in advance, or as soon as possible.
