Course Description:

MGT 300 introduces the principles, functions, and practices in management today; managerial tools for analysis, behavior in organizations, practical applications in problem-solving and decision-making.

Course Method:

This course will demonstrate and utilize basic classroom management concepts. This method relies on interaction among students and the facilitator. Video clips will be used to enhance learning as well as the extensive use of Study Groups.

Group Assignment:

Each study group will be required to give a formal, oral presentation to the class. This presentation will be 20-30 minutes in length, additionally, each group member will be required to give an equal part of the presentation. The topic of the presentation may be taken from any of the main topics to be covered in this course upon approval of the Facilitator. In addition to the presentation, each group will turn in a 8-10 page paper covering the presentation. Paper will consist of a title page, table of contents and reference page. Format may be either MLA, or Little Brown Handbook. Grading of papers will be in accordance with the grading for individual papers. Group presentations may be given when ready, However, all presentations must be given no later than March 18, 1998.

Individual Assignments:

Each individual student will be required to do two papers during the course. These papers may be written on any topic that pertains to the material covered in this course. Papers will be graded on the following criteria:
