COURSE DESCRIPTION: EN102 concentrates on writing papers substantiated by sources. Emphasis is on skills required for research and research writing, such as summarizing, paraphrasing, quoting, evaluating, and synthesizing. Course includes instruction and practice in writing a multisource research paper.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The course is designed to improve the student's writing skills with concentration on the practice and development of research methods.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/POLICIES: Attendance is a must. You are allowed three absences, no questions asked. Each absence beyond this loses you 3 points off of your final letter grade. There will be three papers assigned, as well as several in-class exercises/assignments.
