COURSE DESCRIPTION

The study of classical and modern poetry and drama.
This class will use a seminar setting with group discussions, student presentations, and occasional lectures.

COURSE GOALS

To understand and recognize the elements of poetry through reading and writing about poetry.
To understand the elements of drama by reading and writing about dramatic plays from various time periods.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance and Participation: Attendance is crucial to passing this class, more than 5 absences may cause you to fail the class. Attendance is part of your final grade. To receive full credit, you must attend each class and participate in the class discussion with a familiarity of the reading material.

Assignments: To receive full credit, all assignments must be turned in on the day that they are due, even if you are not in class. Assignments may be turned in early; late assignments will be graded for a percentage of the grade depending on when they are turned in.

Quizzes & Exams: Quizzes may be announced or unannounced. If you miss a quiz, it is your responsibility to arrange for a make-up as soon as possible or you will receive a grade of 0. No make-ups will be allowed after quizzes or exams have been returned to the class.

Papers: All at home essays must be typed and double-spaced or they will not be graded. In class essays will also be part of your final grade. (Any form of plagiarism will cause you to fail the course.)
