RE 360 Ch'an (Zen) Buddhism Summer Interim 1999

Description: This course will examine the development of Ch'an Buddhism in China and the Rinzai and Soto Zen schools as they developed in Japan. The social and liberation aspects of Zen teaching will be examined, as well as religious, environmental, martial, and artistic themes. Students will also practice zazen.

Student Objectives: The Student will be able to:

- * discuss the development of Ch'an Buddhism within the context of traditional Chinese Culture and religions;
- * relate the story of Hui-neng, and discuss the content of the Platform Sutra of Huineng;
- * discuss some of the traditional methods of transmission within the Ch'an schools:
- * practice basic meditation techniques;
- * dialogue with others on the notion of emptiness (nothingness) in the Zen experience;

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- * discuss the contributions Zen makes to the environmental debates;
- * discuss the relationship between the Zen experience and the Western experience of mysticism;
- * discuss the impact of Zen upon Japanese culture within the context of art, architecture, and martial arts; and
- * discuss a personal and social ethics based on Zen Buddhism

Evaluation: Students will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

<u>Readings</u> and <u>Participation</u>: Each student is responsible for completing the readings in the course as assigned in the syllabus, and participating in the discussions on those readings. Students may be required to write short reflections based on the readings and discussions in class.

Presentations: Each student will be asked to lead a discussion based on the assigned readings at least one time during the semester. These may be done as individual presentations or a group presentations, depending on the enrollment for the class.

Exams: There is one oral exam scheduled. The Final Exam will be an essay style exam. Students may be required to answer specific questions during the class times, based on the readings.
