RE 485 Challenge of Peace Instructor: Larry Jones

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<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>: This course integrates the insights of history and theology. It focuses on the great global imperative of our time, building peace based on justice in the nuclear age.

GOAL: For students individually and in dialogue with each other and the instructor to critically evaluate various approaches to the furtherance of world peace within the context of real historical situations of violent conflict and to consider differing religious and theological ways of understanding war and peace. Each session will deal with a particular historical event, a particular religious approach and a particular peacemaking methodology, which to some extent will be related to each other. However, the relevance of each of the three aspects may relate to the other sessions as well.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To deepen our understanding of the complexities of several historical war crises.
- To develop an appreciation of the contributions of differing schools of religious thought in regards to both avoiding war and creating a lasting peace.
- 3. To become intellectually and morally awakened to the urgency of the issue of world peace such that we might each make a larger personal contribution toward that end.
- 4. To be able to be challenged by ideas which differ from our own and yet to respect and care about those who hold them.
- 5. To have a learning experience which is both challenging and fun.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. An inquisitive yet open mind and a sense of humor.
- 2. Attendance at and active participation in all class sessions, including taking notes.
- 3. Completion of all reading assignments.
- A written listing of what you consider the major questions raised by each week's readings.
- 5. Completion of a 6 8 page term paper. At Session #5 you will be asked to turn in a one paragraph statement and to report briefly to the class on your plan for your paper, which is due on last day.
- 6. Mid-term essay exam (session #6) and final oral report based on term paper subject (session #10).
