THE SOCIOLOGY OF DEVIANT BEHAVIOR

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Sociology 320 investigates the field of sociology of deviance, introducing the student to the various theories and research related to conformity and deviance. The student will become familiar with social structure, such as roles and normative expectations encompassed in various social institutions, as well as the processes of conformity and deviance relating to social norms. Various theories of social control and influence will be explored, including functional, conflict, and interaction theories. The functions and dysfunctions of compliance and deviance will be explored. Various examples of social behaviors considered deviant will be discussed in terms of their causes and effects as well as in terms of those who engage in the deviant behavior and those who might be affected by it. Methods of research will be discussed, with students encouraged to conduct projects utilizing these methods. Cross-cultural aspects of deviance and conformity will be discussed.

### COURSE OBJECTIVES/REQUIREMENTS:

Students are required to read the assigned text chapters prior to the scheduled class discussion. Class discussion on the text will generally be held on Tuesday class. Thurssday classes will involve class group discussions on various issues and topics to be announced, as well as student presentations.

There will be two exams during the term. Each exam will be on a specific portion of the text reading materials, as indicated in the class schedule. Exam questions will include sociological terms defined in the text and will include some of the concepts and processes described in the text. The exams will be take-home, long-essay type. Exams will be evaluated on: accuracy, completeness, creativity, clarity of discussion and appropriateness.

Students will be expected to complete a course project. This project is intended to expose the student to a topic of interest in the area of deviance and/or conformity, permitting the student to gain an in-depth understanding, not possible from the reading assignments and class discussions alone. The student may obtain guidance from the instructor regarding appropriate topics, methods of research and sources of information. Also, the instructor is available to review drafts of the project paper. The term paper is to

be from 10-12 pages (double spaced, typed, 12 pt) with the following sections identified: introduction, methods, findings, discussion, conclusion, references. The project can include a primary research effort (survey, case study, content analysis, experiment) and/or a library research effort on an appropriate topic. The paper will be due on Nov 27th (see schedule). The course project will be evaluated on: organization, appropriateness, completeness, scholarship, and creativity.

Extra credit of up to 5% can be earned by students who arrange with the instructor to present a guest speaker or a video on a relevant topic (with student commentary) on one of the Thursday classes during the term. The student will be expected to make all the advance arrangements for the guest as well as any audio-visual equipment needed, and to reserve the time with the instructor in advance.

Each unit of the course will utilize a variety of learning techniques to maximize the student's participation and involvement. There will be lecture-discussions of the text material on Tuesdays, with group discussions on most Thursdays. Students are encouraged to consult with the instructor regarding the written assignments and presentations. Students can meet with the instructor before or after class, or make an appointment.

#### GRADING:

The course grade will be assigned as follows:

Course project 50%
First exam (mid-term) 25%
Second exam (final) 25%
Optional extra credit class presentation up to 5%
Attendance (to resolve ties between two grades)

### POLICY ON ATTENDANCE, LATE ASSIGNMENTS:

The instructor reserves the prerogative of assigning a one-grade penalty for late exams and course projects. The due dates are on the class schedule. Ordinarily a student is not expected to inform the instructor of an absence from class. However, if the student is unable to attend class for an extended period (2 weeks or more) it will be wise to contact the instructor or to leave a message in the instructor's (phone or mail box at West Oahu) explaining the circumstances. This is particularly important when the absence will delay receipt or turning in an exam or paper on the scheduled date. Students are responsible for assuring the instructor receives assignments on time. The attendance role will be used to determine grades only when the earned grade is equally between two letter grades (it will be used to break the tie).
