#### **Course Description**

Spanish 102 is the second part of the introductory course to the Spanish language and the culture of its speakers.

The purpose of this challenging course is to expand upon knowledge gained in Spanish 101. This course will continue to facilitate the practical application of the language in everyday oral and written communication at the beginning novice level.

Upon successful completion of Spanish 102, students will be able to speak and pronounce the language well enough to initiate and sustain some simple conversations with native speakers, accustomed to dealing with foreigners, on familiar topics of a personal or survival nature.

#### **Course Objectives**

Using learned material, students will be able to:

- Engage in simple, social exchanges, concerning personal background, common interests, newsworthy events, dealing with familiar material;
- Express personal preferences in food, entertainment, travel, study, etc.;
- Describe familiar people, places, things, recreation; Make an oral presentation of a personal experience or story;
- Understand and interpret the significance of stories or readings presented in class;
- Restate information concerning these readings;
- 1 Express an opinion or a preference concerning these readings;
- Read authentic everyday materials: menus, signs, maps, postcards;
- Write simple narratives without resorting to word-for-word translation, using vocabulary learned through the lessons;
- 1 Read and write simple poems, songs;
- Improve on self-correction skills;
- Guess the meaning of new vocabulary through context; 1
- Recognize the distinctive aspects of the target culture as they are apparent in visuals, narratives;
- Recognize abstract ideas articulated through the language (e.g., sense of logic, clarity, orderliness);
- Make comparisons between their own language and the target language;
- See grammatical and structural patterns; Recognize more and more cognates.

Grading

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#### Preparation / Participation

In order to afford students the opportunity for maximum exposure to the target language, the majority of each class session will be conducted in Spanish.

Students should NOT be afraid of making mistakes, as mistakes are an inherent part of language acquisition! Participation points are not based on how grammatically correct you are, but rather on if students make a sincere effort to learn and practice the language. Participation is assessed on a weekly basis as shown below.

As a general rule, university courses require 1 - 2 hours of study per hour of class instruction. Therefore, students are expected to be fully prepared and on time every day!

#### Homework

Homework assignments will be checked at the beginning of every class session. Barring absence, no late homework assignments will be accepted!

A point value of 0 - 5 will be assigned per homework, based on a percentage of quality, completed work.

#### Quizzes / Chapter Tests / Exams

The quizzes, chapter tests, and Final Exam will to be administered on the day indicated on the syllabus or stipulated by the instructor.

In case of an emergency, please contact your instructor via phone or e-mail in advance, or as soon as possible. Make-ups will <u>only</u> be allowed for verified medical or work-related absences. Provide the instructor with original, written paperwork documenting the medical emergency or work obligation you had within 24 hours of said absence.

### FOREIGN LANGUAGE LEARNER STRATEGIES

#### (adapted from a University of South Carolina handout, Professor Ken Fleak)

#### HAVE A POSITIVE ATTITUDE and RELAX!!! Your instructor is on your side and wants you to succeed.

#### PARTICIPATION IS A MUST!

Learning a foreign Language is an ACTIVE process, and participating in class will help you internalize the material.

BE A RISK-TAKER!!! It is OKAY to make mistakes in this class.

# ASK QUESTIONS!!!

Feel comfortable asking ANY question - another classmate probably has the same question.

#### ATTEND CLASS EVERY DAY!!!

It will make your life easier. Each day will provide you with a new link to the chain.

#### DEVELOP GOOD STUDY HABITS!!!

Set a study time aside for Spanish every day. First go over what you practiced in class that day. Then prepare the assignment for the next day.

#### THINK IN SPANISH ON THE WAY TO CLASS.

Think of a creative way to greet your instructor, or of a question you might have. The key is to start thinking about Spanish BEFORE you enter the room. In doing so, your transition into the target language will be much easier.

#### JUST GET THE GIST OF IT!!!

Your instructor will be conducting the classes in Spanish. You are NOT expected to understand every word that is spoken. However, if you LISTEN CAREFULLY for KEY WORDS, you should be able to grasp the general idea of what is being said. You may feel lost in the beginning, but gradually you will find yourself understanding more and more.

#### FIND A STUDY BUDDY!!!

Having someone to practice Spanish with outside of class is a great help, especially when exam time comes.

## TIPS FOR VOCABULARY LEARNING:

Pronounce the words out loud.

- Make flashcards.
- Group words by topics.
- Highlight the "problem" words.
- Practice writing and spelling each word.
- ☑ USE the words.
- Make a mental image of each word or actually draw a picture for each word.
- Associate each word with something to help you remember its meaning.

#### (NOTE: The Final Exam is comprehensive. It includes everything learned through the end of Chapter 9.

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Students enrolled in the Evening Program must keep in mind that the 10-week session is the equivalent of one regular school semester. Therefore, although the amount of material covered in a given class session might overwhelm some students, one class in the 10-week program is the equivalent of one week in a regular semester class.

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
